BBC regional spending has increased by an impressive 35% in 5 years*.

Every BBC Nation & Region has seen an increase, except one...

Your BBC licence fee in close up

The BBC is divided into 7 operating areas.

Firstly, the 3 Nations:

Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland

Plus London and 3 English macro-regions:

The North North East, North West, Yorkshire & Humberside

The Midlands East Midlands, West Midlands, East of England

The South South East, South West

London Greater London



The Nations & Regions have been used as distinct reporting divisions by the BBC since its creation






BBC Nations & Regions, by licence fee holders



Of the £80 million operating expenditure in the Midlands, only some £18 million was spent on network production for national television and radio

0% of Radio 1, Radio 2, Radio 3, Radio 5, BBC2, BBC3, BBC4 or peak-time BBC1 is <u>made</u> in the Midlands


There is a <u>connection</u> between the above two statements





Where the licence fee is spent

By each Licence Fee payer





If the <u>same</u> average was spent in the Midlands, as the North and South of England (not including London), BBC expenditure in the region would rise from £80 million to over...

£473 million per annum

The gap is an extra £393 million... per annum








No other Nation or Region sees a <u>lower</u> proportion of its own licence fee spent <u>in the region</u>, than the Midlands

Between 2009 and 2014, every Nation & English Region outside London saw a proportional increase in its licence fee spending except the Midlands






BBC spending comparison across the UK

London

Sources of London expenditure:



London is the base for all television networks, news, national UK radio networks (except Radio 5) and several production departments.

*Other BBC income includes contribution from BBC Worldwide & other commercial ventures. Regional spending – see Appendix



In 2009, the Midlands already contributed 86.1% of its licence fee to spending in London. The <u>highest</u> of any region


By 2014, the Midlands' contribution had risen to 91.5% - the <u>only</u> BBC region that increased

The Midlands contributes <u>more</u> to BBC spending in London, than any other nation or English region, including London itself





Spending by licence fee payer: 2009 v 2014





Between 2009 and 2014, BBC nations & regions expenditure increased by 35.21% from £997 million to £1.348 billion

BBC expenditure in the Midlands <u>decreased by 35.25%.</u> The only region that declined outside London


BBC spending in the Midlands, by licence fee payer, was already the lowest in 2009, even before the decrease!





Why it matters

'The Economic Value of the BBC 2011/2012' (published by the BBC, 2012) gave many reasons for a more equitable distribution of our Licence Fee, including:





Since the closure of Pebble Mill in 2004, the Midlands is the only BBC region that does not contain a network television studio

BBC spending is 6 times <u>higher</u> in the North than the Midlands; 4.7 times <u>higher</u> in the South and 32 times <u>higher</u> in London

There is <u>still</u> one big piece of the regional spending jigsaw that needs to be filled, in the BBC's largest region

50% Let's go halves!


We are not looking for subsidies.

A fair 50% MINIMUM share of our <u>own</u> licence fee, to be spent on programme making in the Midlands, is not a lot to ask.

'The Economic Value of the BBC 2011/2012' published by BBC, 2012

'Driving efficiency at the BBC' published by BBC, November 2014

Midlands and South regional PSB spend for 2014 is estimated by using the figures declared in 'The Economic Value of the BBC 2011/2012'. We have transferred £20 million from the Midlands to the South region to account for the move of Factual Unit & network radio – from Birmingham (2012). No other spending deductions have been made to our Midlands estimate, and no other additions to the South.

London operational expenditure of £2.552 billion is calculated as the net amount after deducting all other Nations and Regions from the total PSB spend provided in the BBC Annual Report 2014.

We have made no other adjustments to published BBC regional spending figures. Spending share by region or licence fee payer are straight-forward calculations using the listed data sources.
